Course Description:

This course explores some of the major issues concerning the role of the youth and the problems confronting them in modern society, with emphasis on the Hong Kong Society. The nature of the conventional wisdom of the "youth problem" is critically examined, with the help of concepts and theories in sociology and related fields. This course is more concerned with understanding the nature of the phenomenon of problematization of youth and looking beyond common sense or public perception on current social issues related to the youth in modern society.

Learning Outcomes:

- 1. Students will be able to capture the extent of youth problem in modern society.
- 2. By introducing a variety of sociological perspectives and concepts, students will be able to gain a more intellectual understanding of the nature and possible causes of youth problems.
- 3. Students will gain a fundamental understanding of how to apply sociological approaches to explain social issues relating to the youth.
- 4. Students will be able to critically evaluate the public perception of social issues relating to the youth.
- 5. Student will be able to reflect on their life experiences in modern society.

Course Assessment:

1. Assignments 10%

2. Final test 40%

This examination will be held in the last class on **November 26 (Tuesday)**. The questions will cover lecture contents and required readings. The format will involve multiple choice question and short questions. The venue is to be confirmed.

3. News Commentary Report 50%

Each student should submit one written commentary report on a youth issue. There is an emphasis on students' reflection on what they learn in the course. In this exercise, students are expected to demonstrate the understanding of the sociological concepts and perspectives taught in this course and how they will help to understand youth problem.

In preparing the report, please think along the following lines:

- 1. Identify and select a youth issue that you are interested in.
- 2. Prepare <u>3 newspaper clips</u> concerning your selected youth issue. The newspaper clips are required to be attached to the report.
- 3. Describe the phenomenon of the selected youth issue according to the newspaper clips. You can also supplement other materials to do the description if deem necessary.
- 4. According to your view, what are the possible cause(s) of the youth issue that you focus on?
- 5. How will you apply the sociological concepts/perspectives learned in this course to make sense of the possible cause(s) of the youth issue?
- 6. Discuss some of the consequences of the issue for the youth and the society.

The length of the text of the report (excluding the cover page, the 3 newspaper clips, and references) should be around 7 double-spaced pages in English or Chinese (font size 12, one inch for all margins). On the cover page of the report, please indicate clearly the course title, the course code, name, and the student ID for ease of identification.

Submission of the report is due on <u>November 29</u>. Students must hand in a hard copy and the "academic honesty declaration statement" generated from VeriGuide. Marks will be deducted for late submission.

Remarks:

- According to the University policy, students are required to submit all assignments in the form of a computer-generated document via VeriGuide (The Chinese University Plagiarism Identification Engine System).
- 2.
